BOMB THREATS AGAINST SCHOOLS

- 1. Is there a problem?
 - Have there been threats that were not reported to police?
 - Identify schools that may have disciplinary problems. Do they keep records of student threats? Assaults on school officials? Bullying? Carrying weapons in schools?
 - False fire alarms
 - Graffiti, hate crimes, vandalism
 - Drug dealing in and around schools, gang violence
 - Identify schools that have been burglarized, set on fire etc. Have they received threats?
 - Bomb threats against targets other than schools.
- 2. Be prepared
 - Does every school have a disaster response plan?
 - Check out your local disaster response team and its plan. Are schools involved?
 - Does the school district have an up to date phone system that allows quick tracing of calls?
 - Do all schools have an effective phone monitoring system installed?
 - Do schools have effective school security programs (e.g., CPTED)?
 - Does your police department and local community have enhanced 911?
- 3. Work closely with the schools
 - Help the school develop a threat reporting system.
 - Help school establish a disaster response team and plan
 - Help train team members
 - Help school develop a program to identify and engage with troubled or violent children.
 - Help schools improve their security against intrusion (e.g. CPTED).
 - Gain the trust of schools
- 4. Collect data
 - Number and kinds of threats, number and kinds of violent incidents, number and kinds of intrusions, etc.
 - These numbers according to which schools and when they occur.
 - Analyze for patterns.
 - Give feedback to schools
- 5. Coordinate with local agencies
 - Fire
 - Bomb squad
 - EMS
 - ATF
 - Local Emergency Management Office
 - School districts
